I am delighted to report that the HBEP was recognised at the recent Planning Institute of Australia (PIA) NSW Planning Excellence Awards! Meanwhile, the NSW Government has moved a step closer to a new Planning Act with the imminent release of its White Paper. The HBEP has been involved in every stage of the consultation process (read our submission here), putting sustained arguments for the inclusion of health and well-being in the new Act. 2013 will see the HBEP deliver a series of workshops on the operation of the NSW planning system, specifically designed to equip health professionals and related stakeholders to engage with the planning process. HBEP Success at PIA Awards

The HBEP received several prestigious awards from PIA NSW. HBEP Director Associate Professor Susan Thompson was elected as a Fellow of the Institute in recognition of her career length contribution to the planning profession. The HBEP's 'Healthy Built Environments: A Review of the Literature' won the Cutting Edge Research and Teaching Award. The HBEP research team led by Jennifer Kent and designer, Jodi Lawton, were honoured for the scholarship and practical policy relevance of both the Review and the more recently released set of Fact Sheets, both of which can be downloaded from the HBEP website. HBEP casual Research Assistant and urban planner, Andrew Wheeler, also received the Outstanding Student Project Award for his Bachelor of Planning thesis entitled 'Planning for Urban Health: An Analysis of Metropolitan Strategic Planning in Australia'. And

over in Western Australia, the <u>State PIA branch</u> awarded a commendation for the second edition of '<u>Planning Australia</u>: <u>An overview of urban and regional planning</u>' edited by HBEP Director Susan Thompson and Paul Maginn.

With colleagues in Population Health, Peter now works with organisations such as local councils, Housing NSW and Landcom to create healthier built environments.
